4-H clubs deliver holiday cheer; community service a year-round effort

Arkansas 4-H members learn early on the value of service to their communities. During the holidays, their efforts shine especially bright.

Across the state, 4-H members are finding creative ways to spread holiday cheer.

In Mena, Christmas came early for 68 senior citizens through Polk County Extension's Santas for Seniors project. About 20 Polk County 4-H members and volunteers delivered food and gifts last week to nursing home residents and elderly individuals in need.

"I love doing community service because I get to help people, and I get to have fun with friends," said Kylee Horn, 10, who was busily packing food bags for assisted living residents at PeachTree Mena.

The Polk County extension office, part of the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture, has hosted the countywide project since 2012. Over the past month, dozens of Polk County residents stopped by the extension office to pick up paper Santas, each of which listed a recipient's age, gender and wish list. Purchased gifts were returned to the extension office for delivery. The recipients — mainly older individuals who lack family —

had modest requests, including clothing, blankets. socks and slippers, pajamas, tissues, snacks and heaters. One recipient asked for a Keurig coffee maker, while another

requested a cell phone. Both had their wishes fulfilled.

"Their wish list is not a guarantee, but many folks who shop will get those higher-priced items," said Polk County 4-H agent Claire Williamson, who coordinates the project. "Many of the residents were nominated and have no idea they're getting anything. We'll be delivering to all four corners of Polk County." Read more here.

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New director of Delta District brings decades of experience to Cooperative Extension Service

As the new director of the Delta District for the Cooperative Extension Service, JJ Jones brings decades of experience in agriculture, natural resources and economics to the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture.

Prior to joining the Division of Agriculture, Jones worked as an agriculture and natural resources program leader and ag

economics specialist for the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service for 20 years. He began his career as an area specialist in farm management at the University of Tennessee Agricultural Extension Service in 1994, where he worked for 10 years.

"JJ Jones comes to us after many years of service to Cooperative Extension in both Oklahoma and Tennessee," said John Anderson, director of the Cooperative Extension Service for the Division of Agriculture. "Working from county and area



positions in extension, JJ has built a strong national reputation for quality work. He is a nationally recognized authority on the economics of small ruminant production.

"He is also well respected among his peers, as clearly demonstrated by his leadership in the National Association of County Agricultural Agents," Anderson said. "JJ has great experience in working across programmatic lines and in linking the resources of the land-grant system to county-level programming. I think he is ideally equipped to step into district administration, and I am excited to see what we can accomplish together as he takes on this role."

Jones received a bachelor's degree in animal science and a master's degree in agricultural economics, both from Oklahoma State University. In his new role as director of the Delta District, Jones will oversee extension staff and programs in the eastern swath of Arkansas.

Tax filing season officially began Monday when the IRS began accepting paper and electronic tax returns.



Get faster refunds by filing electronically and using direct deposit.

Avoid fees for advance refunds

Message from the director



One thing about January, it sure does get over with in a hurry. I am sitting down to write this month's article on the last Monday of the month. In other words, the month is basically over, and I haven't yet figured out what I want to say about it. To those of you out there who still haven't taken your Christmas lights down, I

get it. It's hard to keep up with January.

If, like me, you have been running a little behind, let's take a minute to catch up together. As of Jan. 6, our CES administrative team is complete. Shane Gadberry - well known to us for his years as a beef cattle specialist in animal science – has assumed his responsibilities as Agriculture and Natural Resource (ANR) program leader. I.J. Jones is on board as our new Delta District director. J.J. comes to us from Oklahoma Cooperative Extension, where he served many years as an area specialist as well as in district administration. And finally, our new Associate District directors started in their new roles at the beginning of the month: Pia Woods (Delta), Kris Boulton (Ouachita), and Brad Runsick (Ozark). This is an energetic and engaged group, and they have some great ideas for moving our mission forward. I am excited to see what we can accomplish together.

Departments have picked up where they left off at the end of last year in terms of interviewing and hiring. Extension faculty positions have recently been offered in Entomology and Plant Pathology (ENPL), Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS), and Biological and Agricultural Engineering (BAEG). Speaking of hiring, internship positions are now open across multiple departments in CES. I am a huge proponent of our internship programs. It takes a lot of work to provide students with a quality internship experience — something that is more than just a line on the resume but that actually helps them develop a vision for what their careers can be. The county agents and extension faculty who supervise our interns go above and beyond to make sure those interns have a meaningful career development experience. If you know of a college student, particularly a rising junior or senior, looking for a worthwhile internship, let them know about Arkansas CES internships.

Finally, January is the season for meetings. Production meetings are well underway and will continue through early March. Many of our extension personnel and stakeholders are also involved in national and even international conferences and events this winter. As I write this, I know we have multiple personnel – along with our 4-H state officer team – at Farm Bureau's national convention in San Antonio. Several others will attend the International Production and Processing Expo (IPPE) in Atlanta this week. The pace of educational meetings and conferences at the local, state and national level will be fast and furious for several more weeks. Meeting season is a lot of work, but it offers us wonderful opportunities to highlight the amazing work and the outstanding people of Arkansas CES.
