CHRISTMAS

PINECONE CHRISTMAS TREE



Supplies:

- Pinecones
- Mini Wood slices
- Mini pom poms
- · Green paint,
- Cotton balls
- Gold glitter foam or paper
- Glue (both regular and hot glue)

Steps:

- **1.** Use green paint to paint the pinecone as well as you can. They are bumpy and can be a bit tricky. It doesn't have to be perfect. I
- 2. Let the pinecones dry completely.
- **3.** Trim off any of the little "sticks" on the bottom of the pinecone. This is important so you'll be able to glue it down flat. Hot glue (adults only) your pinecone to a wood slice.
- **4.** Take a few cotton balls and carefully stretch them out. Then glue it around the base of the pinecone tree so it looks like snow.
- 5. After the pinecone has dried, start gluing the little pom poms all around the tree and cut out a gold glitter star from the foam or paper & glue it to the top of the tree

Ingredients:

- Banana
- Skinny pretzel sticks
- Chocolate chips
- Peanut butter OR cream cheese

Instructions

- **Step 1:** Start by slicing the bananas into different heights.
- **Step 2:** Then, have the kids arrange the banana slices on their plate with the tallest piece in the middle.
- **Step 3:** Next, give the children the pretzel sticks and a bowl of peanut butter, or cream cheese. Invite the children to swipe one end of each pretzel stick in the peanut butter. The peanut butter (or cream cheese) will serve as the "glue" to attach the flame to the end of the pretzel sticks.
- **Step 4:** Now, invite the children to place a pretzel in the top of each banana slice with the peanut butter "glue" on top to represent the candles.
- **Step 5:** Finally, the children can add one chocolate chip to the top of each pretzel stick for the flame. You could also use raisins for the flames if you prefer.


NEW YEARS! BOOK IDEAS

Step 1: Start by cutting of the green strawberry top and then cutting the strawberry in half lengthwise. Using your toothpick, attach the sides together to form a heart.


Step 2: Add pretzel sticks



If You'll Be My Valentine by Cynthia Rylant Ages: 4-8 years old



BLACK HISTORY MONTH


GARRETT A. MORGAN

Black History Month is an annual celebration in February, of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history.

Garrett Augustus Morgan was born in March of 1877. While Morgan owned his own sewing-machine repair business, created a tailor establishment, personal-grooming products company, and a newspaper 'The Cleveland Call', he is most famous for patenting the first traffic signal in the United States. "Morgan, himself an automobile owner, witnessed a crash between a car and a buggy. This event supposedly convinced the inventor to create



the stoplight. On November 20, 1923, Morgan received his patent. His traffic signal was mounted on a T-shaped




pole. It had three different types of signals stop, go, and stop in all directions. The stop in all directions signal was to allow pedestrians to cross streets safely. Morgan eventually patented this device in

Canada and Great Britain as well. He sold his patent to General Electric Corporation for forty thousand dollars (ohiohistorycentral.org)."

A suggested activity to do within your classroom is read the book "Saving the Day: Garrett Morgan's Life-Changing Invention of the Traffic Signal" by Karyn Parsons and R. Gregory Christie and print out a green,

yellow, and red stop light sign and play "red light, green light". "Saving the Day: Garrett Morgan's Life-Changing Invention of the Traffic Signal is about Morgan becoming a successful inventor and saving countless lives with his creations. He was a little boy



with a head full of ideas on how to make life better for everyone.

At a tumultuous time filled with racism and discrimination, Garrett became a prominent business man and skilled inventor who produced the traffic signal, a gas mask, and other objects still used today. This second book from the award-winning children's film series founded by Karyn Parsons, Sweet Blackberry, comes a little-known story about a man whose talent would be a gift to the world."
