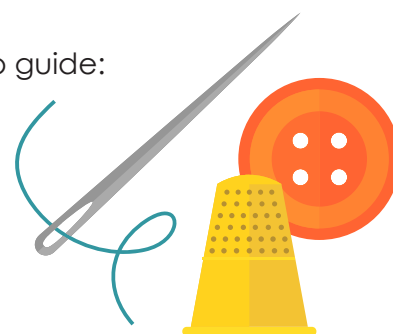

PROPERLY FASTENED: Sewing on a Button

Sewing on a button is a simple and useful skill! Here's a step-by-step guide:

YOU WILL NEED:

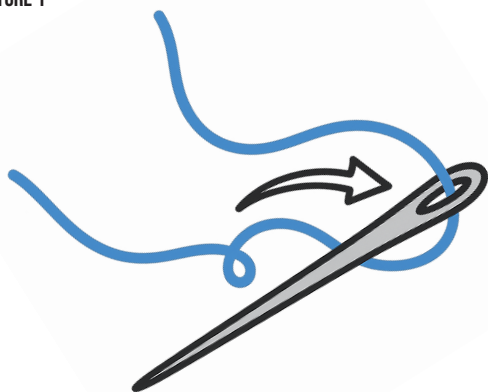
- Needle & matching thread
- Scissors
- Button
- Straight pins for spacing (optional)
- Thimble (optional)



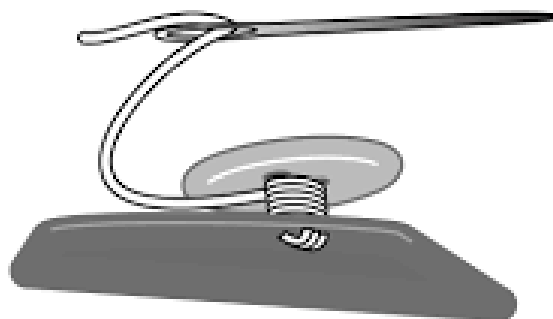
STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS:

1. **Thread the Needle:** Cut 18-24 inches of thread. Thread the needle and tie the knot at the end of the thread (picture 1).
2. **Align the Fabric:** Place the button where you want it on the fabric. If it's a shirt or jacket, line it up with the corresponding buttonhole. Use a pin over the button (between the holes) to create space if it's a thick fabric or needs a "shank." (picture 2).

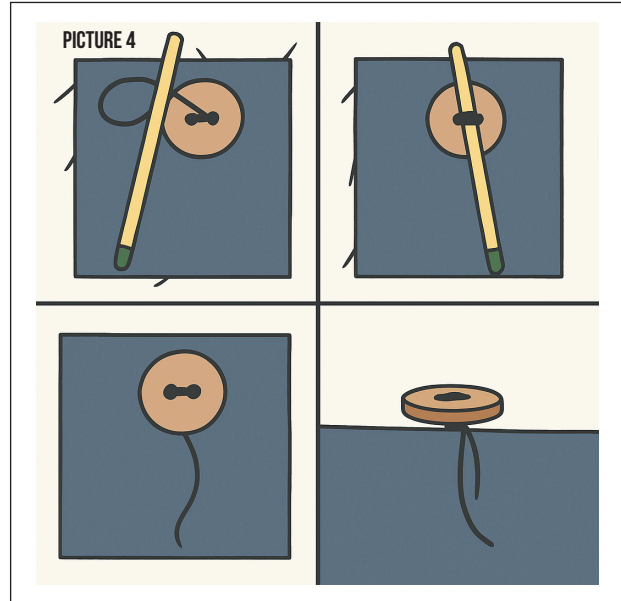
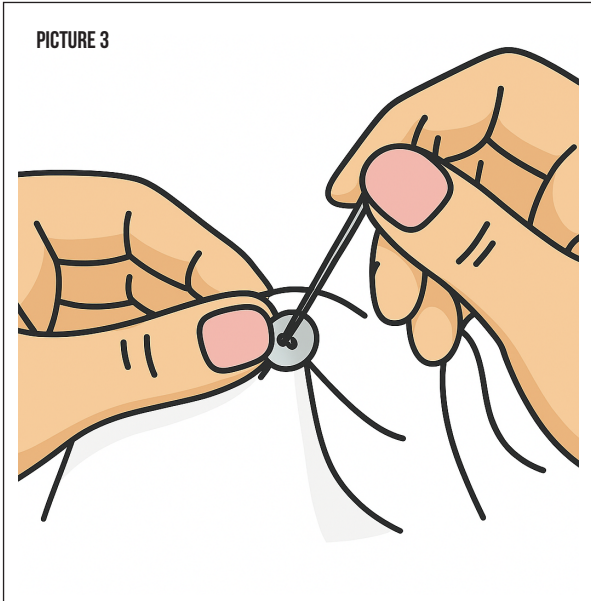

3. **Start Sewing:** Go down through the opposite hole (for a 2-hole button) or criss-cross for a 4-hole button. Repeat 3–4 times for each hole pairing to secure it. (picture 3).



4. **Create a Shank:** If using a spacer (pin), remove it. Bring the needle up through the fabric, but not through the button. Wrap the thread around the stitches under the button 3–5 times to create a “shank” (a bit of slack so the button is easier to fasten). Push the needle through to the back. (picture 4).
5. **Tie Off:** Make a small knot on the back side of the fabric. Stitch through the fabric once more and loop the thread to tie a second knot. Snip off the extra thread.

EXTRA TIP:

- ☐ Use strong thread to keep the button secure.
- ☐ Use a fabric pencil to mark exactly where the button should sit.
